

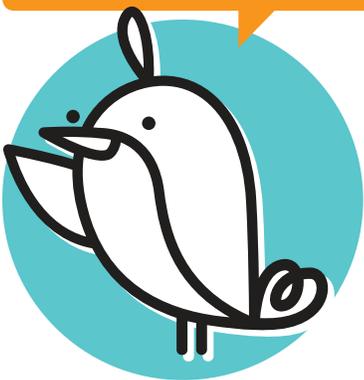


Grade 4 • Ages 9-11

What Would You Do?

Students learn to make responsible choices and treat others with kindness in their communities. This unit includes skill building in responsible decision-making, collaboration, and appreciation for people and situations in our lives.

Kindness means being friendly, generous or considerate to ourselves and others through our words, thoughts and actions.



Unit Objective

Student will identify positive ways that peers and family members show support, care, and appreciation for one another and their community, including learning to work as a team and analyze why being thankful is an important part of being kind to themselves and others.

Suggested Introduction

For the next few days, we are going to learn more about what it means to make a difference in our community through kind actions. What are some ways that we can show kindness in the community?

Allow time for students to respond and discuss, either as a class or in small groups. You can also use this time to introduce Kindness Concepts (caring, gratitude, responsibility) and create community definitions for these concepts or share the definitions listed below. Consider using the Kindness Concept Posters for caring, gratitude and responsibility as a way to reinforce learning.

Kindness Concepts

Consider writing key terms on the board before class to introduce vocabulary and increase understanding.

CARING Feeling and showing concern for others.

GRATITUDE Being thankful for and appreciating what you have and those around you.

RESPECT Treating people, places, and things with kindness.

RESPONSIBILITY Being reliable to do the things that are expected or required in your life, home, community and environment.

Unit Notes

The activities in this lesson focus on a central theme and connect to different academic curriculum areas.

The lessons are intended to be easy to teach and fun to use while helping to develop social and emotional skills.

Lesson activities use a variety of modalities to address different learning styles and build on each other.

Each lesson includes choice of evaluation or reflection questions, which can be written, discussed or used as journal entries. Consider writing these on the board before the lesson begins.

The activities also incorporate key Kindness Concepts, which can be introduced before teaching the lesson or as the concepts are discussed in the lesson. Consider displaying the [Kindness Concept Posters](#) during the unit. Establishing kindness as the norm in your classroom positively influences classroom culture. By setting kindness as the expected behavior and having everyone agree to that norm, your students gain responsibility for maintaining an environment that is kind to everyone

Regularly revisiting the topics or questions raised during discussions will expand student understanding of the concepts. Scripted explanations are provided, but feel free to use language that feels natural for you.

| Lesson 3: Toxic Swamp Crossing | Students will work together with a small group to cross any imaginary swamp. | <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Masking tape• One “swamp boards” (sheets of paper or cardboard) per student• RAK Journals• Kindness Concept Posters for Respect and Responsibility |
| Lesson 4: Kindness Club | Students will be introduced to the Kindness Club and will plan what the structure of the group will be moving forward. | <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Kindness Club materials will depend on how they choose to show kindness in the community• Optional: “Ways to be Kind” sheet from Kindness Scenario lesson• Kindness Club Plan Sheet• Kindness Journal for the class• RAK Journals• Kindness Concept Posters for Caring, Gratitude, Responsibility |
